It's also quite strange to be in a long queue of traffic to find that the reason for the delay was there were several horses aimlessly walking down the road.


Will close now as the chicken need shutting in, but it's too wet to go gardening.



Gardening Jobs For July

Last month I said who knows what June would hold, and now the deluge of rain is passed perhaps we will have a proper summer!

In the veg garden:

If you haven't already, you should now stop picking rhubarb. While
there might still be plenty of stems, leaving the plant now will help to
keep the crown strong and ensure you get another good harvest next
year



- Depending on the variety and when you planted your potatoes, you'll soon (if not already) be harvesting first or even second early potatoes. Like most vegetables, potatoes are best eaten as fresh as possible but when harvesting a big crop, store the unwashed tubers in a cool, dark place.
- Beetroot is a very versatile vegetable and it can be used in a number of ways. It's great
 cut into chunks and roasted in a tray bake, and when you have a glut of roots, why not
 pickle them for eating well into the autumn
- Your tomatoes should be coming along nicely, and I imagine you'll have plenty of fruit starting to form. Don't overwater plants as you'll risk fruit splitting, this can also happen if you leave ripe fruit on too long so keep on picking!
- If you can reach, it's a good idea to thin out apples to leave fruit growing in pairs, this gives them a bit more space and helps improve airflow as they ripen

In the flower border:

- Early summer is a good time to give wisteria a little bit of a prune, from old wood count up seven new buds and cut off the excess—this should help the plant flower better next year
- Taller plants like cosmos and dahlias will benefit from being supported, as they can easily get top heavy once they are covered in blooms. While metal plant supports are rather attractive they can be pricey, bamboo canes and string make a good alternative
- If you are growing vigorous climbing plants such as rambling roses up
 a wall, you need to keep on top of them, by tying them in regularly and pruning out any
 excess growth

Mini Garlic Focaccia:

Something different for your summer BBQ - hopefully - Makes 6.

Ingredients:

500g pasta flour or strong bread flour 1½ tsp salt 7g dried yeast 320g water 3 tbsp. olive oil

Method:

In a bowl, mix flour, salt and yeast then add

water and oil, knead to a smooth dough, cover and let it rise at room temperature for about 1 hour until doubled in size.

Preheat oven to 220 C (200 fan), on a lightly floured surface divide dough into 6 portions, roll to a ball and place on a tray covered in baking paper, lightly flatten the balls, making dimples all over them with your fingers.

Mix 4 twigs of rosemary, 2 tbsp. olive oil, 1 grated garlic, a little pepper and 1 tsp sea salt in a small bowl and brush all over them. Bake for about 20 minutes.

From the Mountains of Japan

No.13 - Spinning into Japan's silky past

English classes get cancelled for various reasons, but when I arrived at my Monday mountain school of around 20 students, to find out they were cancelled due to the silkworm arrival was a new one.

Up to a hundred years ago, silk was Japan's biggest export. In addition to major factories, the women on many farms would produce silkworms as a side hustle to supplement their main income. These days, there's still a cottage industry, but much of the silk is made as a school project by remote mountain schools like mine.

The kaiko (silkworms) used for silk production are entirely domesticated and can't survive in the wild. They eat only the leaves of the kuwa (mulberry) tree. Incidentally, one possible origin of the song "Here we Go Round the Mulberry Bush" came from the British attempt to copy the Chinese silk +industry cira 1800, which failed due to the mulberry's propensity to die in the chilly British winters. But I digress...

Each student at this school is responsible for about 100 silkworms. On the first day after the teacher picked up a couple of thousand from a factory in south Nagano, a local TV station showed up to watch the children picking leaves from a tree behind the school and feeding them to the inch-long worms. Over the next six weeks or so, they should grow to about the size of a forefinger, then make a cocoon of woven silk. At this point, they are usually boiled to kill the grubs—a point of contention for many animal rights groups—as the domesticated moths have wings but can't fly—and then the cocoons are dyed.

Each cocoon is made of a single strand of thread about 900m long, which the teacher in charge of the operation then uses a homemade contraption involving an electric drill to unwind. The children then wind the thread around

wooden boards to make lampshades, which are sold in local shops.

With a mulberry bush in the garden, I took a handful home for my daughter, where they were met with excitement rather than the expected revulsion. She was, however, horrified at the thought of boiling the grubs, and when I pointed out that the moths were flightless, loudly proclaimed "I will teach them to fly!"



I look forward to seeing how that plays out...!

Cocktail of the Month 'Serpentine'

The Serpentine is a grown up cocktail that features rum, brandy and sweet vermouth, with lemon juice to marry them all together...

...While sweet vermouth definitely doesn't have everyone's blessing, this is one recipe that blends it into the whole nicely.

YOU WILL NEED:

- •1 ounce light rum
- 1/2 ounce brandy
- 1/2 ounce sweet vermouth
- 1/2 ounce lemon juice
- 1/2 teaspoon superfine sugar

METHOD:

.Fill a shaker halfway with ice rubes. Pour in all ingredients and shake until chilled. Strain the mixture into a cocktail glass and garnish with a twist of lemon.



Health Tips

As the summer approaches, please ensure you hydrate properly and use sun protection. If you suffer from hay fever, check the pollen count on a daily basis, have a quick shower when you get back from work to wash out the pollen to give you hopefully a better night's sleep.

Water, drinks and hydration

Water is a healthy and cheap choice to keep you hydrated, but other drinks can also count towards your fluid intake. We also get some fluids from the foods we eat.

Not getting enough fluids can lead to dehydration.

Daily fluid intake

Most people should aim to drink enough during the day so their pee is a clear pale yellow colour.

The Eatwell Guide recommends that people should aim to drink 6 to 8 cups or glasses of fluid a day. Water, lower-fat milk and sugar-free drinks, including tea and coffee, all count.

You may need to drink more fluids if you're:

- pregnant or breastfeeding
- in a hot environment
- physically active for long periods
- ill or recovering from illness

Children

The best drinks to give children are water and milk.

Children should avoid sugary fizzy drinks, squash and juice drinks completely.

Tips to help you stay hydrated with healthier drinks

Do

- · drink regularly throughout the day
- swap sugary drinks for diet, sugar-free or no added sugar drinks
- adults can choose lower fat milk
- drink extra fluids if you've been sweating from physical activity, or if you're unwell – water is the best way to replace lost fluids
- dilute squash drinks or cordials well to reduce the sugar content
- drink caffeine in moderation

Don't

- do not have drinks that are high in sugar too often they're higher in calories and the sugar can damage your teeth
- do not have more than 200mg of caffeine a day if you're pregnant this could increase the risk of miscarriage or low birth weight

The Life of Model Railway Buff

Part 5: Part of the enjoyment of the layout is running the trains and there is a myriad of choice of engines and rolling stock. You can choose from steam, diesel or electric locomotives from all over the world and from many eras. The fun on your own layout is that the choice is yours so you can either be pedantic to the letter or, like me, you can pick and choose your favourites. Because I wanted the trains to be "all singing and dancing" they needed to be computer chipped. This meant having to convert my older locos wherever possible as well as buying new ones. The ones that couldn't be upgraded have honorary rolls as parked items in the sidings. I currently have sixteen, which my other half reckons is plenty but all enthusiasts know, there is no such thing as too many locos. In addition to the sound functions that the computer chip adds I have also installed lighting such as the firebox in the loco, external front and taillights and internal lighting in the carriages.

The Simplon Orient Express carriages even have table lights in the dining cars. Some of the carriages are the original ones from the 1950's. There are goods wagons and passenger carriages, some of which are Bn and are plain and heavy but still treasured.

Reflections of a Steam Fireman

In March 1966 we had a visitor to the loco, a small 2-6-0 standard class 3 tender engine 77014, this class had never strayed onto the southern and cause a lot of interest from train spotters and depot staff.

It had worked a pigeon special down from its home depot in Cheshire (Northwich). The engine was in a poor state, you opened the regulator and steam would escape from worn fittings and

you had a job to see where you was going.

It was taken into the loco and rods were removed, now this is normal for an engine going for scrap, they would be placed in the tender and towed away, but the tender was still filled with coal, so being nosey I asked a fitter and I was told it was going to be allocated to our loco and the fitters were instructed to give it the full works. Boiler washout and examination, rods and big end bearings white metalled, pistons removed and new rings fitted, all leaks eliminated.



The fireman and Drivers all looked forward to trying this newcomer out. It was down on traction (drawbar pull) effort only 21,490 compared with a Q1 30,080 N 26,035 or A U "23,866 that it was replacing and it was put to ballast work. Standard class had an enclosed cab where, N and U were open cab if weather was rough you had to fit a storm sheet, from the cab top to the tender and I had the pleasure of working this locomotive on a number of occasion.

It seemed to manage with the work that it was rostered - no trouble, when you let the fire get low to keep the loco quiet in a built up area and no shunt movement were needed you could see two boiler stays were needing attention. I pointed this out to my driver and he said it was not a problem.

They would sizzle, just like putting water on a red hot plate, no driver put a fault card in, so they had a quiet word with the fitter who deemed it safe, otherwise it might have gone to scrap.



All staff in loco were quite fond of this newcomer, and it was immediately requested for rail tours double headed with a 2-6-0 standard class 4, so much so that the last Steam working on the Southern Region was on the 9th July 1967 the 2132 van train from Bournemouth to Weymouth and was hauled by 77014. It was the last of its class and was not preserved and was towed away from Weymouth for scrap.

Before straying to Northwich it worked on the Whitby line.

This class worked mostly in Scotland and the North Eastern and strayed to the London Midland.


Young Farmers: May has been a bit of a quieter month for the club with lots of members busy silaging with the fantastic weather we have had. However we held our



We are writing to inform you that, regrettably, the Postmaster has resigned from operating Lewdown Partner Service, Qenthiock and St Ive Outreach Services. Therefore, these services will be closing on Wednesday 25 June 2025 at 13:00.

When a Post Office branch closes, as in this instance through the postmaster resignation or, unexpectedly, Post Office undertake a comprehensive review of the network to ensure that it continues to meet evolving customer needs in a very challenging economic climate. This review examined the network at a very detailed, local level, analysing customer demand and accessibility of Post Office services. Consequently, we are not looking to replace Lewdown Partner Service, Quenthiock and St Ive Outreach Services at this time.

If you have any questions you would like to raise about this matter, please write to me via the National Consultation Team at the address shown at the end of the letter. Please note that your comments will not be kept confidential unless you expressly ask us to do so by clearly marking them "In Confidence".

Any future changes to service provision would be handled in line with our Principles of Community Engagement. An extract relating to Notification is available at the end of this letter.

We will display posters in the local area to inform customers.
