Abbreviated minutes of Ordinary meetings held on 8th July 2025 These minutes are provisional until they are signed by the chair at the next meeting of the parish council. Meeting No 735

Present: Cllrs Leroy St Louis (Chair), Law (Vice chair), Alexander, Chick, Lorna St Louis, Terry. Cllr Chris Edmonds (WDBC), Peter van Delft (clerk),

- 1. Members of the public open forum no members present
- 2. Dispensations & declarations of interest none
- 3. Minutes of previous meeting 734 were signed as a true and accurate record of that meeting. Proposed Cllr Lorna St Louis, seconded Cllr Alexander, all in favour
- 4. Finance 4.1 Authorisation and to pay the following invoices Vision ICT Email account £16.00, Peter van Delft clerk salary (May- June) £341.60, HMRC PAYE for clerk £17.40, I.C.O. Annual renewal fee (D/D) £47.00. Proposed Cllr Alexander, seconded Cllr Leroy St Louis, all in favour. 4.2 New bank account update The R.F.O. informed that a new Commercial Instant Access acc. has been opened with Lloyds Bank, the sum of £3000 being transferred from treasurers acc. 4.3 R.F.O. reported a combined credit balance of £4,573.90 after authorised payments. Proposed Cllr Law, seconded Cllr Terry, all in favour
- 5. Cllr Edmonds of WDBC reported that he wished to comment on item 12.
- 6. Planning app. 1767/25/FUL Retrospective application to regularise installation of a permeable farm track. Sunnybrook Farm, Portgate, Lewdown, EX20 4PZ. Council decision Object Proposed Cllr Leroy St Louis, seconded Cllr Lorna St Louis, three councillors supported the application, three councillors objected, the chair having casting vote, voted to object.
- 7. Reports from Councillors Cllr Alexander reported that the defibrillator had been used recently, however, he informed that the battery did not appear to be fully charged. The clerk to inform the Stowford Parish Hall committee. Cllr Alexander also informed that a Mabrak meeting had taken place last month, he informed that the proposed changes could have serious ramifications for the parish if a response to the proposal was not thoroughly considered. It was resolved to include the Mabrak proposal at the next meeting. Cllr Chick received an enquiry regarding a planning proposal in the village. The chair informed that W.D.B.C. planning department had a telephone service (chargeable) that could help out with providing the initial guidance but planning advice would still need to be sought by the appropriate authorities. Cllr Terry informed that tree saplings had started to grow in and around the church triangle. The clerk informed that this was a matter for Stowford PCC.
- 8. Table Tennis promotion and organisation. The chair reported that he spoke with some parishioners that expressed an interest in helping to run a group. The chair to follow up.
- 9. Replacement bench located at Stowford Cross Bus stop. The clerk informed that the bench was due to be delivered at the end of July.
- 10. Parish Questionnaire draft questions and reply box A reply box has been erected in the porch of the Stowford Parish Hall. The chair provided a first draft of a questionnaire informing that it was hoped to be of a more engaging but less formal document. The main points being how the community could be better engaged within the parish including community connection, participation and inclusion, fun and fellowship, imagination and future vision. Cllrs to respond to the draft by 16th July.
- 11. Highways reports Cllr Leroy St Louis reported that he reported pot-holes on the D.H. website and that the problem was repaired within three days. Cllr Chick reported that a parishioner had complained about an overgrown hedge in the village, Cllr Leroy St Louis also had received a complaint about the same hedge. The chair informed how the complaint could be reported on the W.D.B.C. website or on the Devon Highways website. Cllr Leroy St Louis suggested that councillors and parishioners could 'self-serve' for quicker and accurate reporting, however the parish council was still there to help. The chair suggested that the appropriate procedure to self-serve could be posted on the facebook page and Newslink.
- 12. Dog fouling, nuisance dog(s), dog(s) of leads Mobile Liaison Officer report and update. The chair informed that the item is to be discussed under 'Part 2' guidelines.
- 13. Mobile phone training Training programme for parishioners. The chair informed that he approached 'Learn Devon' if training was available. Free training was available for a minimum of 6 parishioners, details to follow and promotion to be arranged. It was resolved that the hall costs to be initially paid by the parish council and that it may then be recovered by L.D, proposed Cllr Law, seconded Cllr Terry,

- motion carried. The chair to make arrangements.
- 14. Clerk contact details contact & new email account. The clerk informed that the parish councils new email account had been set up and that he was working on making it fully available by September. The clerk informed that his digital telephone land line service was not being renewed and enquired if the p.c. wanted a telephone service then it would need to provide a means to do so. It was resolved that a "virtual" telephone service would be provide by the council, motion proposed Cllr Law, seconded Cllr Terry, all in favour. The chair to make arrangements.
- 15. V.E. Day 75yr commemoration tree Replacement of existing dead tree. The clerk informed that the second Oak tree had died. An alternative genus would be required to successfully grow. It was resolved that alternatives are provided for the next meeting. The clerk to enquire.



A Lovely Fresh Greek Salad:

Can't wait to go on holiday? Here is a culinary nod to get you summer ready

For the dressing you need:

3 tbsp. red wine vinegar

4 tbsp. olive oil

2 cloves of garlic

Handful of fresh oregano

¼ tsp salt

Some black pepper

In a bowl, mix vinegar and olive oil, press the garlic, chop the oregano, add to the bowl, season with salt and pepper.

1 red pepper

1 yellow pepper

4 tomatoes

10 baby gherkins

3 red onions

100g olives, stoned

200g feta cheese

Slice peppers into strips, cut tomatoes into wedges, add to the dressing. Cut gherkins lengthwise into strips, chop onions into rings and mix with the olives. Arrange everything on a plate, crumble up the feta and sprinkle over the salad, garnish with the mint leaves, season and eat.

Thriller of the Month: The Sleepwalkers by Scarlett Thomas



From the Mountains of Japan

No.14 - Car Ownership

If you're from the UK, getting a license and a car is easy. The two countries have an agreement, so if you have a British license, it's as simple as showing up at the local driving centre and taking an eye test. Initial licenses are for one year, with the period extending with each renewal up to about five years in duration. Each time you go to renew, however, you must watch a portion of the dreaded video...

The video is a looping traffic safety documentary of the kind of thing shown in schools. It's very boring, which is why an inspector will walk up and down in the video room, reviving anyone who falls asleep. A guy in front of me nodded off halfway and got woken with a sharp strike from a rolled traffic safety magazine. Usually, you only have to watch about twenty minutes, but if you incur a minor traffic violation, at your next renewal you have to sit through the full 1.5 hours. A stop line infraction last summer means that I'm on the condemned list for early in 2027. I'll be sure to get the coffee in beforehand.



When it comes to buying cars, things can be a little tricky. Anyone can buy a car, but there is a bunch of seemingly pointless paperwork involved. You'll need a personal stamp, a form proving the stamp is yours, proof of address, proof of employment, and proof of

a parking space. None of these are ever found in the same building, meaning multiple trips around town to acquire them. The quirkiest is the parking space document, which requires you to get a photocopy of an aerial map showing your house from the city library, on which you then draw your spot in pencil.

Once this is all submitted, you're good to go. And a fine car it will be too. There's no such thing as a banger in Japan. Every two years, cars are required to pass a strict examination called a "shaken" (literally "car-test") which checks everything from wiper blades to alignment of headlights. There are also hefty inclusive taxes to be paid, so you'll pay upwards of 500 quid even if your car is problem-free. When there is something major to be fixed, it's often cheaper to simply buy a new car. As a result, it's extremely rare to see a car broken down by the side of the road. Twenty-one years in Japan and I've never seen one.

Another quirk of Japan is that car insurance isn't compulsory. You'd be a fool not to have it, though. Referring back to the no bangers thing, if you run into a posh Lexus, you don't want to be paying for the damage out of your pocket.



The last entry was on 29th November 1946, the following entries relate to those children who transferred to Lewtrenchard School after Stowford School

had closed. I am not sure of the exact date of closure, however, the school was registered as a deed on 25th July 1923 and that the school property was permitted by an act of parliament to be sold or let to on 31st March 1950. On 29th November 1950 Stowford Parish Council became the new owners of the property for the sum of £275, the chairman at the time was William Davey.

We've also been putting in new water troughs in fields as many of them are too small for the amount of cattle in the





field and with the increasingly hot summers they are no longer fit for purpose.

I've decided to take a cow and calf, our stock bull and a yearling heifer, luckily the cow and bull are already halter trained from previous years. Our first show is Woolsery on Monday 28th July followed by Launceston on the Thursday after. Fingers crossed for good weather!!

Gardening Jobs For August

We certainly had plenty of sunshine in July! This month plays host to a number of local village shows, with the Lewdown village show on Saturday 23rd being the crowning glory on what is sure to be a great month.

Top tips for the shows:

Last year I shared a few top tips for getting ready for the shows, and this year I've got a few more which I hope will come in handy:

- Plan and prepare your transport in advance. While most vegetables
 can simply be transported in trays, flower displays and vases of cut
 flowers need more care. I tend to use old buckets to transport a few
 vases in each, as the tall sides reduce the chances of the contents
 falling over.
- Start selecting your entries early, you can use coloured ribbon or string to
 mark things like runner beans, tomato vines and cucumbers while they
 continue to grow on the plant. This way you won't accidently snip off a
 potential prize winner before it's time to pick them.
- It may sound silly, but take a photo of your entry form before handing it in. That way
 you won't spend the evening before the show scratching your head trying to remember
 exactly what classes you entered, and won't waste time
 preparing for classes you didn't actually enter.
- At the village shows, bigger doesn't always mean better, unless the class is heaviest potato. In most of the classes the judges are looking for a nice uniform set, which have been well grown and well presented.
- The more entries the better, so give as many classes as possible a
 go and who knows you might have yourself a winner. At the end of the day, the local
 shows aren't about winning and are all about supporting a great local event!

Other jobs for this month:





Which direction is he bus moving in:





There are many great music festivals taking place over the summer, which people either attend, or enjoy in the privacy of their own environs thanks to the broadcast media, but for me, there is only one, and that is the two month's musical extravaganza we call The BBC Proms!

Everyone knows about the famous last night party, but not everyone is aware of the importance of the Proms to the international Music scene, the encouragement of new composers, the commissioning of new works, and the availability of affordable live music.

The Proms now, are very different from the first season in the Queens Hall in 1895, but they are the same Proms. The have grown and developed, they have become more diverse, both in music performed and in those who perform, able to attend and listen, and they are, arguably, internationally the most important classical Music event in the calendar.

What happens in the church of God now is very different to what happened with the apostles, in the Celtic church, at the reformation, or in the "great days of the Victorian era", but we are the same church. Sir Henry Wood, the founder of the Proms was passionate about introducing new, and often controversial, pieces to the audiences. Many of these were met with derision but are now firm favourites in the hearts and minds of many radio listener and concert goer.

As the church continues to evolve, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, we engage with new ideas and new concepts, many of which will at first seem foreign or strange, but which end up being eternally treasured. After all, Harvest Festival was at first Parson Hawker's bright idea! I look forward very much to hearing a mixture of old favourites and new challenging music in this year's Proms, and equally looking forward to some reassurance, challenges and growth in our church life.


